




PEER SUPPORT

STUDENT COUNCIL

The purpose of Kerikeri High School's Student Council is to give the student body a voice in several important aspects of the school. Year level representatives, Head Prefects and a Deputy Principal meet fortnightly to discuss school matters and organise funding activities and allocations of the Student Council money. In 2017 the Student Council was involved in several behind the scenes endeavours that have benefited our school and have set up business for next year.

The Student Council has been involved in projects such as Pink Shirt Day to raise awareness of bullying behaviours. We provided funding to sports teams for Tournament Week and Aims Games and to the sailing team in order to support their pursuits. We also provided support to outstanding individuals to aid them in their goals this year, one of whom went to Serbia and another to the Youth Commonwealth Games. We encourage sporting, cultural and academic teams to contact the Student Council for regional, national and international support.

Technology and BYOD are becoming widespread at Kerikeri High School so our group looked to advance this



development. COWs (Computers on Wheels) have been in our school since 2015 and are a way for students to access the internet without moving from the classroom. Seeing the success of the project, the Student Council decided to fund an additional COW with the aim that more students can access computers in any given class period. We also looked to have a plaque made to show our contribution to the purchase of the COW, to indicate the impact of the Student Council.



Dux and Proxime Accessit

To be considered for the top awards of Dux and Proxime Accessit at Kerikeri High School a student must first be a Top Scholar. At that point, every Top Scholar comes into contention. Each Top Scholar's other achievements, demonstrating the Kerikeri High School philosophy of success across the four cornerstones of a balanced education, are researched, considered and rated. It is even more exceptional when a Top Scholar achieves at the highest levels in other cornerstones.



Sophie Morrison was awarded Proxime Accessit in 2017.

Sophie was a Top Scholar every year since 2014, being awarded Honours Academic for both NCEA Level One and NCEA Level Two. In the Leadership and Service Cornerstone Sophie has been a Class Representative, Peer Support Leader, Keri Reading Tutor, a Tuakana and a Prefect. Sophie also has three Honours Awards for Sport, a Cornerstone where she excels. Sophie has participated in an extraordinary twenty diverse sporting codes from Floorball to Triathlons for Kerikeri High School.

Sophie was selected for the New Zealand Hockey Under 18 Development Squad, the Northland Talent Hub and Pathway to Podium Programme. She is a Northland Under 18 Hockey Representative, was selected for the Northland Womens' Hockey team, and won an ASB Northland Secondary Schools' Sporting Excellence Award for Hockey this year. Sophie was the winner of the Lawrie Kendall Memorial Cup for Senior Girls Sporting Excellence for the last two years. She has been awarded the prestigious \$30,000 Sir Edmund Hillary Scholarship for tertiary education. In 2018 Sophie will be starting her Bachelor of Management Studies at Waikato University.

The Kerikeri High School Dux for 2017 was **Jack Williams**.

Jack was awarded Honours Academic for NCEA Level One and NCEA Level Two. He was a Top Scholar in Year 9, Year 10, Year 11, Year 12 and Year 13 and ever since excelling in Lit Quiz and the Regional Science and Technology Fair as a junior, he has participated in a wide range of Academic Extension Activities.

In the Cultural Cornerstone Jack has been involved in Debating for most of his time at Kerikeri High School and was a semi-finalist and finalist over several years in Speech Competitions. In the Sporting Cornerstone during seven years at Kerikeri High School Jack has played across a range of eleven Sporting codes for the school, this year in two top teams, Mixed First Eleven Hockey and First Fifteen Rugby.

It is in the Leadership and Service Cornerstone for Kerikeri High School that Jack has excelled – as a Coach, with the WAKA Video Making Team, a Peer Support Leader, Keri Reading Tutor, Class Representative, Librarian, Kiwi Buddy, Chair of the Student Council and Head Boy. Jack has been awarded Honours for Leadership and has accepted a Victoria Excellence Scholarship for 2018. He will be studying Law and International Relations at Victoria University next year.

A PLASTIC OCEAN

Year Nine students hosted an event to raise awareness about the effects of plastic in our environment. At the event, we screened the awardwinning documentary A Plastic Ocean, showed our inquiry work, had a raffle and held a sausage sizzle. All the money we raised went to The Plastic Ocean Foundation so they can continue their research on the effects of plastic in our oceans.

This event was part of our Social Studies inquiry learning. We learned how problematic plastic is for our environment. We explored the issue of sustainability and good use of our natural resources, with our focus on plastic pollution. Some of the shocking facts I learned were that marine plastic pollution has impacted on at least 267 species worldwide; that 100,000 animals are killed by plastic bags each year; and that the fish we eat have microplastics in their bodies that we then ingest when we eat them.

If everyone pitches in and does a little bit in reducing their plastic consumption rate, it will make a massive difference in preserving our planet so the future generations can still enjoy our amazing natural world.

University Scholarships

ongratulations to the following Year 13 students who have been awarded Scholarships to support them in their tertiary studies. This year an incredible total of \$557,500 of Scholarship funds was offered to 30 Kerikeri High School students. This is a credit to our students and to the Four Cornerstones philosophy of our school.

Alice Autet and Stella Green were awarded the prestigious University of Otago Academic Excellence Entrance Scholarship worth more than \$40,000 over three years. The Scholarship established by the University of Otago Council in 2011 assists new undergraduate students who have demonstrated outstanding academic potential and leadership capabilities.

The Sir Edmund Hillary Scholarship was awarded to **Sophie Morrison**. This is the University of Waikato's premier school leaver Scholarship, valued at \$40,000 over the four years of her degree. It supports students to continue to excel in a sporting code or creative or performing art, to achieve high academic standards, and to develop leadership qualities through a tailored leadership and personal development programme.

Jamie Struthers and Jerry Tang received the University of Auckland Academic Potential Scholarship. The University received over 750 applications for this Scholarship from students throughout New Zealand. All the applicants were talented and able students. This Scholarship is Tier 1 and is valued at \$20,000 over three years. Sarah French also received this Scholarship at Tier 3 and will receive \$6,000 over three years.

The University of Auckland Top Achiever Scholarship recognises exceptional students, who have outstanding academic achievement and demonstrated leadership potential. This year Tiana Edwards, Lauren Harrell and Libby Inwood were awarded this Scholarship which is valued at \$20,000 for one year and guarantees a place in a hall of residence.

Nyena Weeds and Guy Yarrell were awarded AUT Vice Chancellor's Significant Student Scholarships. Awarded to students demonstrating leadership through academic excellence and also achievement at a high level in sporting, cultural pursuits or community involvement, the value of this Scholarship is up to \$6,500 per year for three years.

Nyena was also able to accept the McDonalds Te Tai Tokerau Scholarship. McDonald's New Zealand established an annual sponsorship programme with the Auckland University of Technology (AUT) in 1993. The primary aim of this Scholarship is to extend education opportunities to Māori students from the Northland region, with a value of \$12,500 over

Arni Bailie-Bellew and Eve Robson-Clark were awarded University Of Otago Leaders Of Tomorrow Entrance Scholarships which assists students who have demonstrated all-round ability and who exhibit leadership potential. The Vice-Chancellor was particularly impressed with Arni's exceptional academic achievements and awarded her a further \$4,000 as a Vice Chancellor's Scholarship to go with the usual \$6,000 Leaders of Tomorrow Entrance Scholarship.

University of Otago Alumni Entrance Scholarships provide for students who have demonstrated academic ability. Donated by Alumni of the University of Otago, the Scholarship has a value of \$6,000 and was awarded to Kitty Holden and Chloe Mountain

As part of the Maintenance Engineering Institute of New Zealand's objective to encourage training into tertiary education and technology, a MESNZ Scholarship is offered each year to cover tuition fees. The Bill Buckley Engineering Scholarship is available to assist students commencing study towards a MESNZ/IPENZ accredited engineering degree, diploma or certificate. This Scholarship worth \$5,000 was awarded to Tassilo Eisenmann.

Courtney Armstrong was awarded the Massey University Albany Vice-Chancellor's Innovation and Academic Excellence Scholarship. This \$5,000 Scholarship recognises student achievement for academic excellence at secondary school and innovative thinking. The successful recipient must be committed to study and completing a degree on the Albany campus.

Five Massey Student Accommodation Scholarships are available to new students and may be awarded on the basis of academic achievement, sporting achievement, contribution to the arts, or community service. Shannen Frear received the Scholarship valued at \$5,000.

Shannen also received the \$5,000 Massey Business School Future Leaders Scholarship. This was established to recognise and support emerging leaders enrolling in full-time business and agricommerce programmes at Massey University.

A Victoria Achiever Scholarship for School Leavers valued at \$5,000 was awarded to Bianca Maddox who is intending to undertake a Bachelor's degree programme at Victoria University of Wellington. Scholarships are awarded competitively on the basis of academic merit and other criteria.

The University of Waikato awarded Jasmin Winikerei a Northland Future Leaders' Scholarship. These Scholarships are awarded on the basis of leadership, community involvement, contribution to cultural and sporting activities and other personal attributes including character, academic ability and a commitment to succeed. This award has the value

Victoria Excellence Scholarships were awarded to Laila Abada, Felix Drew and Jack Williams. By helping high-achieving undergraduate students to come to Victoria, the University recognises them as New Zealand's future scholars. These Scholarships are valued at \$5,000 for the first year of study and contribute to fees or accommodation costs at Victoria University.

Zoe King-Samuels, Kate Edwards and Taran Kern received University of Waikato Scholarships, valued from \$3,000-\$4,000, which can increase to \$6,000-7,000 if the student achieves NCEA Level 3 Endorsed with Excellence. The Scholarship is based on academic achievement and will provide support towards either tuition fees or accommodation in the University's Halls of Residence.





























OUTDOOR EDUCATION



Sailing Academy
















The Sailing Academy offers a variety of sailing opportunities and caters for a wide range of ability levels from first timers through to advanced sailors.



CROSS COUNTRY


Nearly 500 students took the field to compete in this year's Kerikeri High School Cross Country Championships. The fine day made for excellent running.

This year the **Tough Guy and Gal Challenge** saw us travel to a new venue with a 12km course that was hillier and even tougher. Forty-five of our students lined up at the start amongst the other schools to complete the run, winning Kerikeri High School the titles of Toughest Female team and Toughest Male team. **Shine Fulton** smashed the course in 48 minutes, minutes ahead of his nearest competitor. Top individual results from the day were: (Male) 1st **Shine Fulton**, 2nd **Jared Thomson**, 3rd **Adam Bennett**, 4th **Bay Fielding**, 5th **Darcy Morrison**; (Female) 1st **Kate Moyle**, 2nd **Hannah Watson**, 3rd **Kayla Donaldson**.

A very successful team of competitive swimmers participated at the Northland **Swimming** Championships in Dargaville. First placings went to: **Ariella Ripohau** 100m backstroke; **Maia Williams** 50m butterfly; **Jamie Doubleday** 50m freestyle, 50m butterfly; **Emilia Finer** 50m freestyle, 100m freestyle; **Harvey Williams** 50m backstroke; **Kori Brown** 100m breaststroke, 50m breaststroke, 50m butterfly; **Giorgia Davies** 100m freestyle; **Archie White** 100m backstroke, 50m freestyle, 100m freestyle, 50m breaststroke; **Bryna McCondach** 50m butterfly; **Samantha Turner** 50m freestyle; **Nicola Dearnley** 100m breaststroke.

Kori Brown, Giorgia Davies, Nicola Dearnley, Emilia Finer, Alexandra Ludbrook, Benjamin Turner and Samantha Turner competed at the Div2 New Zealand Swimming Champs. Medals went to Samantha who achieved a silver in the 50m freestyle, and Emilia a bronze in the 400m freestyle. Every student achieved outstanding placings or personal bests at the event. A group of swimmers also went Swimming New Zealand's Junior Festival in Auckland. The best placing was a 4th for Emilia Finer in the 400m freestyle. Emilia also had six other top ten placings. Ariella Ripohau achieved a 6th place finish in the 100m backstroke. Oli White, Barbara Kuruleca and Gyanne Garner each achieved personal best times.

Archie White competed at the NZ Short Course Championships held at the Sir Owen Glenn Complex in Albany. With over 750 swimmers, competition was fierce. Despite an ankle injury, he was 18th in both the 50m and 100m breaststroke.

Nine swimmers represented Kerikeri High School at the NZSS Swimming Championships. Ben Turner and Harvey Williams achieved personal bests in all five of their races. Ben also qualified to swim 100m backstroke at the Div 2 Champs and Alexandra Ludbrook swam a qualifying time for 50m backstroke. Emilia Finer had the best race placings, finishing in the top 20 for all her events despite being the youngest competitor at the meet. The team all enjoyed the opportunity to compete against the best swimmers in their age groups in the country.



Global Issues Problem Solving

This year Global Issues Problem Solving teams grappled with the topics of Space Junk, Genetics and 3D printing. Twelve Teams, from Year 7 to 10 sat the qualifying booklet in term three. It was good to see students understanding the importance of topic research to support their booklet work and ideas as well as developing their collaboration skills in their teams.

A Junior Global Issues team of four Year 7 students qualified to compete at the Future Problem Solving National Finals in Auckland. During the year, almost 400 students participated in this competition. These students investigated the potential challenges in a futuristic scenario, related to Identity Theft. They had to identify what they deemed to be

the most significant issue and develop a futuristic action plan. They were then required to present a Dramatic Presentation of this action plan. Our students came third in the Dramatic Presentation and second in the Booklet Competition at the National Finals, qualifying them to represent New Zealand at the International Finals in Wisconsin, USA in 2018.

In 2016 and 2017 at the Northland Secondary School Sports Awards Alex Edwards won ASB Sporting Excellence Awards, recognising her national achievements in Spearfishing. This year she is the New Zealand Junior Women's Spearfishing Champion and placed second in the New Zealand Open Woman's Spearfishing Championship. Alex represented the New Zealand Open Spearfishing team at the Inter Pacific Championship in Guam earlier this year. She is also a member of the Northland Sports Talent Hub.



Sydney Bavastro has been involved with Inline Hockey for several years and is a member of the Northland Stingrays side. This year he was selected to represent New Zealand at the Trans-Tasman Inline Hockey Oceania Championships. Sydney won Sporting Excellence in Inline Hockey at the ASB Sports Awards.

Sophie Morrison has been involved with Hockey at Kerikeri High School for five years. She is a member of the Kerikeri High School team, and plays Woman's Premier Hockey for Chilltec Old Girls in Whangarei. Sophie is a member of the Northland Under 18 team, and the Northland Women's team which came second at the National Provincial tournament. She has been selected for the New Zealand Under 18 Talent Identification programme and is currently a member of the Northland Talent Hub and the Pathway to Podium hockey programme. Sophie has been awarded Sporting Honours three times, and this year won the ASB Sporting Excellence in Hockey Award.

Kyle Chen has received Kerikeri High School Sporting Honours four times for his elite achievements in Boxing. He has won numerous New Zealand and Australian age grade welterweight and middleweight titles. In 2016 and 2017 at the Northland Secondary School Sports Awards Kyle won ASB Sporting Excellence Awards, recognising his national and international achievements in Boxing and in 2017 was also awarded overall Sportsman of the Year. This year Kyle represented New Zealand at the Youth Commonwealth Games in the Bahamas, where he performed with distinction winning a bronze medal. Kyle is for the second year the New Zealand Golden Gloves Middleweight Youth Champion.

Kyle has won the New Zealand nationals three times and the Taiwan national championships twice. He currently has a record of 38 wins and 6 defeats following a move from the junior to youth ranks in amateur boxing last year. Kyle has been accepted into the International Boxing Association's Road to Buenos Aires programme, in preparation for the 2018 Youth Olympic Games in Argentina.

Gateway in 2017 has been another busy year, with 124 placements in total involving 107 students. Gateway's aim is to strengthen the pathway for students to progress from school to the workplace. Our students work in a variety of industries and many complete workplace assessments. For most, Gateway is an opportunity to gain work experience and be able to add it to their Curriculum Vitae. It supports our students in making a decision as to whether this career is a suitable pathway for them.

Students need to, on average, earn 20 credits with Gateway. To support our students we have run two Health and Safety courses, two First Aid courses and then individualised programmes. We ran our courses during the school holidays to avoid affecting curriculum time.

During the year we are proud to have had students leave school with electrical and plumbing apprenticeships, and students have apprenticeships lined up for next year in diesel, automotive, small engines, building and plumbing. Students have gained part-time work with their Gateway employers or gained work due to their placement or having sat one of the courses we offered.







WOOLF FISHER FELLOWSHIP



Mrs Maddy Haydock was one of ten teachers in New Zealand to receive a Woolf Fisher Fellowship for 2017. The Fellows never know they will receive one until they are informed, and because of that no applications can be made for the award. Fellowships are to enable excellent practitioners in education to visit outstanding schools overseas. The experiences of the Fellows are intended to benefit recipients as teachers in furthering educational practice in our own schools by examining different teaching practices overseas. Mrs Haydock travelled to Hawaii over one week of term time and the school holidays, where she had pre-arranged visits with a variety of schools which she thoroughly enjoyed.





Reflections

We have a saying in our Prefects Team that it is not about the badge or the blazer it's about our legacy - leaving Kerikeri High School a stronger school as a result of our work this year. We walk in the footsteps of many students, many families, whānau and members of our wider school community and we are proud to be able to say that Kerikeri High School is going from strength to strength.

Why do I say strength to strength? The Four Cornerstones of a balanced education are really working. The concept of pushing yourself out of your comfort zone and trying to develop yourself across the cornerstones was novel in its day. It has become a proven way to not only push yourself to be more than you might have been as a student in our school. It has become an unparalleled way to credential yourself for the challenges of the years to come. Our in depth tracking of all your four cornerstones activities as well as your academics, has meant that when we write references for our students for scholarships and for employers, we can accurately describe your participation and achievements at Kerikeri High School with great detail.

Kerikeri High School is stable and successful. This is reiterated by independent measures over time: in the top 10% of schools with a 4-5 year ERO return in 2011, winner of the inaugural Prime Minister's Award for Excellence in Teaching and Learning in 2014, a second 4-5 year ERO return in 2015, and 'best ever's' in NCEA results in 2016. These are the independent measures.

But it is more than about pass rates. It is about every one of our students. I was more proud of the increase in the number of our Māori students achieving NCEA Level Two than I was of the pass rate going from 69% to 81%. In only four years, over twice as many Māori students were passing NCEA Level Two at Kerikeri High School, 59 students compared to 25.

We are big, the biggest school north of Auckland, and we make the most of it, focusing on each and every student. Think about the wrap around care for our Year Seven students so that they can develop their confidence in our big environment and what that means. They have got the Science Laboratories, Art and Music rooms, Technology and Culinary departments, Gym, pools and travel to all the amazing specialist subject Teachers.





Being bigger means that we can offer a great range of specialisations and employ specialist Teachers that can follow their passion. Performing Arts, Technology, Chemistry, English Media Theory, Rural Studies, Business Studies - our Course Guide is exciting.

The Four Cornerstones really work and so does positive reinforcement - in our school we say WAKA. We are proud that we undertook a Student Wellbeing Survey and pinpointed a few key things that needed improvement. In response our staff and student WAKA Team developed an excellent video, we did work in our classes, we added our rotoscoping and now we have a shared language around STOP.

Successful, stable and future focused. Technology has the power to produce more powerful learning. It also has the power to strengthen our relationships and make our work more meaningful. COWs are on the range: Computers on Wheels, 11 of them now. We would like it if every



student could bring a device, however, we recognise the challenges to that ideal for our school community. We are getting as many COWs out there as we can afford.

We are making the most of technology to strengthen relationships for communication and feedback. The APP is awesome; Parent Student and Teacher Meeting bookings, student voting for the Board, Options Choice and EOTC choice online is all technology at work.

Back to the legacy of 2017. We talk about distributed leadership leadership at all levels. And we've got it. Student leadership is powerful with our role models choosing to give service as Peer Supporters, Tuakana, Librarians, Kiwi Buddies, Prefects, Keri Reading Tutors and Student Councillors. Our student leaders also have a strong volunteer ethos, from Work Day to Daffodil Day to the Great Art Exhibition.

Our Teachers are leaders - in New Zealand with raising achievement for Māori students and in their curriculum areas, as well as in our community. Our Leaders of Learning, Deans and our Senior Leadership Team work relentlessly with intelligence and care, to keep our School moving from strength to strength.

And our Board, PTA and wider community strongly support us. No more is that strong, positive Kiwi volunteer philosophy evident than with our Board Chair, Mrs Sue Richards, who while supported by the Board takes on the weight of critical friend to the School and moving the School forward through all eventualities.


















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
