Dux and Proxime Accessit

To be considered for the top awards of Dux and Proxime Accessit at Kerikeri High School a student must first be a Top Scholar. Each Top Scholar's other achievements, demonstrating the Kerikeri High School philosophy of success across the four cornerstones of a balanced education are researched, considered and rated. It is even more exceptional when a Top Scholar achieves at the highest levels in other Cornerstones.

The Proxime Accessit for 2018 is our Head Girl, **Isabella Joe**.

Issy has excelled especially in the Cultural and Leadership with Service Cornerstones, having a particular talent in public speaking and being involved in a wide range of leadership endeavours as a role model. She has also participated in a range of ICAS academic extension opportunities and achieved NCEA Level One and NCEA Level Two with Excellence.

Issy won the McDiarmid Cup for Senior Speech, excelled in other Kerikeri High School Speech Competitions and has represented Kerikeri High School at Regional Speech Competitions. She has been a Tuakana in Te Roopū Tautoko, a Keri Reading Tutor, Class Representative, involved as an official in Netball and involved in other sport. This year Issy is the Head Girl, a Peer Support Leader and was our Guest Speaker at Matariki.

Issy has been awarded Kerikeri High School Honours three times; twice for public speaking and once for Leadership. She was elected by the students as the Student Trustee on the Kerikeri High School Board. Issy has been awarded the University of Auckland Māori Academic Excellence Scholarship and in 2019 is intending to study Law.

The Kerikeri High School Dux for 2018 is **Lauryn Jarman**.

Lauryn has also excelled especially in the Cultural and Leadership with Service Cornerstones and has been a Top Scholar every year since Year Nine, participating to a high level of achievement in a full range of academic extension opportunities.

Lauryn has fulfilled significant leadership roles, being a Prefect, a Keri Reading Tutor, a Peer Support Leader, a Kiwi Buddy, and also helped with Daffodil Day, was on the Ball Committee, is a Coach and Debating Adjudicator and has been a Tuakana for Te Roopū Tautoko.

Lauryn was awarded Honours an outstanding four times, for Academic NCEA Level One and NCEA Two, for Public Speaking and for winning the ICAS Medal for New Zealand for Writing. Lauryn's team won the Northland Secondary Schools´ Senior Debating title and for the second year was named Student Coach of the Year. The University of Auckland awarded Lauryn a prestigious Top Achiever Scholarship for 2019. She is planning to study Law and Global Politics, with the intention of working in the field of Human Rights.

Model United Nations Assembly

The Rotary Model United Nations Assembly is an event open to Year 12 and 13 students from Auckland and Northland held at Auckland Girls Grammar. Students are allocated countries from around the world in teams of three; the teams from Kerikeri High School represented Equatorial Guinea, Qatar, and Spain.

Students took part in a working Model United Nations Assembly in which students embodied their nation and its beliefs. Each nation and its

delegates spoke for three minutes about two out of five remits. These remits ranged from examining the integrity of elections in member nations, to the United Nations actively enforcing the protection of women's rights in member nations. Each remit was intensely debated from nations both for and against, as well as various nations pushing for amendments to the remits. As well as an impromptu debate, Equatorial Guinea also took part in an emergency Security Council meeting.

University Scholarships

Congratulations to the following Year 13 students who have been awarded Scholarships to support them in their tertiary studies. These scholarships are prestigious, and many come with substantial financial awards and mentoring. This acknowledgement of the hard work and success of our students marks an excellent start to their Tertiary Studies and we wish them all the best.

University of Auckland Top Achiever Scholarships were awarded to **Lauryn Jarman** and **Lucia Avery**. This year the University received over 1650 applications for these awards from students throughout New Zealand. Valued at \$20,000, these Scholarships recognise exceptional ability and outstanding achievements.

Our Head Girl **Issy Joe** received the University of Auckland Māori Academic Excellence Scholarship of \$20,000. The purpose of the Scholarship is to recognise and reward exceptional academic performance, combined with outstanding sporting, artistic, cultural and/or leadership achievements among Māori students.

The University of Otago Performance Scholarship encourages excellence in areas of performance including sport, culture, music and the arts. It is available to students who have demonstrated a high-level of ability in their chosen area of performance. For exceptional applicants, this Scholarship will be awarded at a higher value in year one, which is the case for **Alex Edwards** who will receive \$20,000.

Mila Urlich accepted the University of Otago Māori and Pacific Peoples' Entrance Scholarship, valued at \$15,000. Established by the University in 2005 to celebrate academic excellence and cultural diversity, this Scholarship encourages the progression of Māori and indigenous Pacific Peoples' into tertiary study.

The McDonald's Te Tai Tokerau Scholarship was awarded to **Stacey Ferguson** for study at Auckland's AUT University, with a value of \$12,500 over three years of study. The primary aim of this Scholarship is to extend education opportunities to Māori students from the Tai Tokerau region.

The University of Otago 150th Scholarships provide for students who have demonstrated academic ability and meet several further application requirements. This year **Rebecca Thomas** received this \$10,000 Scholarship.

Alex Poore was awarded the \$6,500 AUT Faculty of Engineering (Honours) Scholarship for students who have demonstrated academic excellence and intend to study in the Faculty of Engineering.

Tara Jackson accepted the AUT KIWA Undergraduate Scholarship (Māori and Pacific) valued at \$6,500 and Stacey Ferguson and Grace Jennings received the AUT Vice Chancellor's Significant Student Scholarships of \$6,500. Students must demonstrate leadership through academic excellence and achievement at a high level in sporting, cultural pursuits or community involvement. Izzy Crossland and Bryna McCondach accepted AUT Academic Excellence Scholarships of \$6,500 awarded to students demonstrating academic excellence. Recipients of these Scholarships who meet the eligibility requirements at the completion of their first year can apply to receive the AUT Undergraduate Scholarship (Fees) available for all subsequent years of study in an AUT Bachelor's degree.

The University of Otago Leaders of Tomorrow Entrance Scholarship assists students who have demonstrated all-round ability and who exhibit leadership potential, to attend the University of Otago. **Nicola Dearnley** and **Abby Ngan** accepted this Scholarship valued at \$6,000.

Dylan Haynes received a \$5,000 Massey University Accommodation Scholarship, awarded on the basis of academic achievement, sporting achievement, contribution to the arts, or community service.

Kaya Tobin accepted the Victoria University of Wellington Tangiwai Scholarship for Excellence and **Sophia Houben** was awarded a Totoweka Scholarship for Equity and Support. These Scholarships valued at \$5,000 each can be put towards accommodation costs at a Victoria hall of residence, or as a contribution towards first-year living costs.

The University of Waikato Manaaki Tangata Scholarship is to provide support for students who show evidence and potential for future tertiary study. The \$5,000 Scholarships awarded to **Lili Kolo** and **Mia Kolo** will provide financial assistance towards accommodation in the University's halls of residence.

Georgia Herbert accepted the \$5,000 University of Waikato Manu Kaewa Scholarship. Te Manu Kaewa is a reference to the adventurer in search of new horizons. The Scholarship is awarded primarily on the basis of evidence of academic readiness (NCEA Level 2 results), leadership, and strong community spirit. Georgia, Lili and Mia were also awarded the D.V. Bryant Trust University of Waikato Residential Scholarship of \$2,500, for students who have a proven academic record and are staying in either the Bryant Hall or Student Village Hall of residence.

The University of Otago Vice-Chancellor's Scholarship was established to celebrate the excellence of students enrolling at the University of Otago. No application is required as the selection of recipients is at the discretion of the Vice-Chancellor. **Hinemoata Reremoana** and **Annette Pilapil** were honoured to be awarded this Scholarship worth \$5,000.

Ninety-six senior Māori students qualified to have a Matariki Certificate awarded for their achievements from June 2017 to June 2018 in accordance with the Māori calendar.



Academic News

After two months of training with Harcourts Kerikeri, **Rose Elliott**, **Luke Halligan**, **Nathan Gibson** and **Max Hart** travelled to Auckland to compete in the 2018 Schools Auctioneering Competition. They learnt how to market and auction a property, becoming accomplished auctioneers in the process thanks to the mentoring of Mr Ross Paterson. We were delighted when **Max Hart** won the



Schools Championship Competition. Max and **Rose Elliott** subsequently represented New Zealand at the Australasian Auctioneering Championships in Auckland.

After a successful National Competition in November 2017, a team of four Year Eight Problem Solving students (**Zoe Ackers, Ella Howells, Ella Parker** and **Emma Thompson**) travelled to the University of Wisconsin, La Crosse, USA in June to compete at the Future Problem Solving International Conference. 





Soon after, our amazing Kapa Haka group Te Pou o Manakō produced two outstanding performances, the second of which was streamed on the big screen outside for those who were not inside the gymnasium. Alongside our Prefects, at the end of the twoday festival they also supported the handover of the Mauri to Whangarei Girls' and Boys' High Schools, hosts of the 2019 Tai Tokerau Festival. 

Community Problem Solving

■radescantia is an invasive weed species that smothers native seedlings and stops our Northland forests from regenerating. A Community Problem Solving Team called the Tradescantia Terminators is now attacking it.

The fight against Tradescantia started in 2017. Under the guidance of Dr Dymock, a Northland Entomologist, and with the help of Year Seven students, the Tradescantia Terminators set about collecting beetles that had recently been introduced into New Zealand by Landcare Scientists. The beetles come from Brazil and only eat Tradescantia. With a blessing from Ngāti Rēhia Kaumatua Alan Munroe the beetles were released along the Wairoa Stream Track.

In 2018, the fight continued with another weapon, manual weeding. Assisted by Year Nine students and members of the community the CmPS team removed Tradescantia from flood prone areas along the stream where the beetles were likely to be washed away. The Tradescantia was then composted in weed bags made by the team. The weeded areas were subsequently planted with native trees, including 300 manuka seedlings. A 'Terminator Tank' was made then donated to the community to be used in the ongoing war against this invasive weed.

The Tradescantia Terminators want to thank their primary sponsor Comvita Kiwi Bee NZ, Friends of the Wairoa Stream, Vision Kerikeri, ShadeHouse and all the Facebook followers that have been cheering the Team along.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

The 25th Future Problem Solving New Zealand Finals event was bigger and better than ever before. Community Problem Solving projects were submitted from across New Zealand, with the best six invited to compete at the 2018 National Finals. Our Tradescantia Terminators team earned an invitation, so off we went to Auckland for a weekend of fun challenges, creativity and serious competition.

The team had two hours to set up their display then went into a 30-minute panel interview throughout which each team member answered questions on aspects of their project. That night each team gave an account of their project to the 200 participants. 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

The Sailing Academy offers a variety of sailing opportunities and caters for a wide range of ability levels from first timers through to advanced sailors.






ateway is a work experience Gprogramme where mature and work ready students are encouraged to work one day a week for a minimum of six weeks. It is open to students in Years 12 and 13. In 2018 we placed 109 students in 130 roles with 62 different employers.

Students who undertake Gateway are working in real workplaces, gaining work experience and building skills for employment. Students are expected to earn 20 credits while on Gateway. including Core Generic Unit Standards that they complete throughout the year. We also put on First Aid courses and Health and Safety courses in the school holidays, to avoid disrupting curriculum time. Where possible, we organise units of work from the Industry Training Organisations.

We provide students with specialised gear and equipment including safety boots, high vis vests, bee suits, leather gloves, black dress pants or a builders apron. For students who cannot make their own way to the placement, we can provide transport. We encourage students to find their own placement, however we have a great relationship with many employers so will always contact them if a student is unable to do so themselves.




We have students doing work experience in a range of pathways from Barista to Early Childcare, to Sports Administration and Agriculture. Many students gain part-time paid employment or even apprenticeships from their Gateway employers. Students gain references from employers and develop skills they can add to their Curriculum Vitae.

During 2018 we have had students leave Kerikeri High School with a panel beating apprenticeship, a marine electrical apprenticeship, and apprenticeships lined up for the new year in barbering and plumbing. 




