University Scholarships



Students awarded University of Waikato Scholarships

Congratulations to the following Year 13 students who have been awarded Scholarships to support them in their tertiary studies. These scholarships are prestigious and come with substantial financial awards. This acknowledgement of the hard work and success of our students is a credit to them and to the Four Cornerstones philosophy of our school.

Aaron Bertelink and **Sara Legler** were awarded the Te Paewai o Te Rangi: University of Waikato Scholarship for Outstanding Academic Achievements, valued at \$25,000. The University of Waikato awards up to 50 Scholarships for outstanding academic achievement annually based on academic excellence, leadership potential, and community citizenship.

University of Auckland Top Achiever Scholarships were awarded to **Acima Mabidikama, Isaac Chandler, Jonty Kirk, Kate Ward, Katey Whitehead, Leo Mooney** and **Sophia Fotheringham**. This year the University received over 2000 applications for these awards from students throughout New Zealand. Valued at \$20,000, these Scholarships recognise exceptional ability and outstanding achievements.

University of Auckland Academic Potential Scholarships were awarded to **Bryan Hori, Gavin MacMillan, Eli Molloy-Walt** and **Kate Moyle**. The scholarship amount varies between \$10,000 and

\$20,000. Tier one also guarantees a place in a University Hall of Residence.

Josh Harper and **Lisa French** accepted the University of Otago Māori Entrance Scholarship, valued between \$10,000 and \$18,000. Established by the University in 2005 to celebrate academic excellence and cultural diversity, this Scholarship encourages the progression of Māori and indigenous Pacific Peoples' into tertiary study.

The University of Waikato Te Ara Whānui Scholarship was established in 2018 and recognises the importance the University assigns to fostering, developing and protecting excellence of kapa haka, kaupapa māori, tikanga, te reo and mātauranga māori. Valued at \$10,000 this scholarship was awarded to **Mia Anderson, Yves Brown** and **Brodie Campbell**.

Tea Rasclas accepted the Massey University Vice Chancellor's High Achiever Scholarship with Distinction. Only 30 are available nationwide, valued at \$7,500 per scholarship.

The University of Otago Leaders of Tomorrow Entrance Scholarship was awarded to **Ayla Galbraith** (\$6,000) and **Leah Green** (\$18,000). The scholarship assists students who have demonstrated all-round ability and who exhibit leadership potential to attend the University of Otago. **Anton Aslund** received the \$6,000 University of Otago 150th Scholarship, which provides for students who

have demonstrated academic ability and meet several further application requirements.

Max Hart, Giorgia Davies, Sara Dray and **Sophie Fox** accepted the Victoria University of Wellington Tangiwai Scholarship for Excellence and **Holly Billington-Field** and **Ryona Winwood** were awarded Totoweka Scholarships for Equity and Support. These scholarships valued at \$5,000 each can be put towards accommodation costs at any Victoria Hall of Residence or used as a contribution towards first year living costs. **Max Hart** was also awarded the PwC Scholarship \$7,000, which provides financial support during University, a mentor and a paid summer internship at PwC.

Madaya Butler, Paige Edwards and **Samantha Dearnley** received the \$5,000 University of Waikato Manu Kaewa Scholarship. Te Manu Kaewa is a reference to the adventurer in search of new horizons. The scholarship is awarded primarily based on evidence of academic readiness (NCEA Level 2 results), leadership and strong community spirit.

The Massey University \$1,000 Scholarship awarded to Promising Māori Design student went to **Leah Dawson** and **Mana Wihongi** due to the high level of their portfolio work. **Jordan Going-Edwards** was supported by her Iwi with the Ngātiwai Trust Board Scholarship valued at \$750.

Kerikeri High School Dux 2019

The Dux is a Top Scholar who demonstrates through their achievements, the Kerikeri High School philosophy of success in the four cornerstones of a balanced education – academic, sporting, cultural and leadership with service – as well as exemplifying our WAKA values.

This year we had two outstanding candidates who were jointly awarded our top award of 2019 Kerikeri High School Dux: Hannah Watson and Max Hart.

In addition to being a Top Scholar in Year Thirteen, both Hannah and Max were Top Scholars in Year Twelve, Year Eleven, Year Ten and Year Nine. They were both awarded Honours Academic for NCEA Level One and NCEA Level Two. In addition, they have participated in a wide range of academic extension competitions from ICAS to Australian Mathematics and Future Problem Solving.

In the Sporting cornerstone, Max and Hannah have been exceptional, participating at Kerikeri High School and beyond, between them in Swimming, Rippa Rugby, Rugby Sevens, Netball, Futsal, Cross

Country, Basketball, Cricket, Tennis, Squash, Volleyball, Tough Guy-Tough Gal Secondary Schools Mud Run, Orienteering, Table Tennis, Football, Floorball, Croquet, Turbo Touch, Triathlon and Athletics.

Both students have also been outstanding in the Cultural cornerstone, being involved in Debating, Auctioneering, Speech Competitions and in their younger years Music Tuition, Kapa Haka, Musical performances and "The Blue Airplane". They are both Kerikeri High School Speech Competition winners.

In the Leadership with Service Cornerstone they are also exceptional. Prefects, Executive Student Council, Peer Support, Ball Committee over two years, Kiwi Buddy for International Students, Class Representative, Te Roopū Tautoko, Daffodil Day, WAKA Video Making Team and supporting our students at Te Tai Tokerau Festival. They volunteered as Enrolment Day Assistants, for the Recycling Action Group, Coach, Umpire, Adjudicator and Keri Reading Buddies.

Hannah has two Honours Cultural in two disciplines, Debating and Public Speaking. Max has Honours Cultural

Hannah was the joint recipient of the Senior Debating Award, won the Student Sporting Coach of the Year and Student Umpire of the Year Awards, the Kerikeri High School Service to School Award and the William Thomas Graveson Study Award.

MATHEX

We had a strong sign up with 47 teams registered to compete in Mathex. The winning teams then represented Kerikeri High School at the Northland Mathex Regional Competition in Whangārei. More than 100 teams of the best Year 7-10 mathematical brains from schools around Northland lined up to compete.

Mathex is an exciting, fast-paced night with teams of four students posed with 20 tricky mathematical questions, attempting to gain a full score of 100 points. Our top placed

The Student Council have met on a fortnightly basis, regularly feeding back input from Class Representatives at each year level. In these discussions we have contributed ideas as to how Workday money could be allocated, as well as responding to specific requests and the use of Mufti Day fundraising.

This year, the Student Council proudly contributed \$10,000 from our Workday funds towards new chairs in the Auditorium, a stylish new grey colour with the school name and logo engraved onto the chair. This was a popular upgrade because of the chairs' neat look, larger size and greater comfort. We have also been able to purchase new piupiu for the Kapa Haka roopū thanks to money put aside by the 2018 Student Council.

As the Student Council, we have also supported both individual and team sports. We contributed \$400 to each team travelling to Tournament Week this year and the same amount to the AIMS teams travelling to Tauranga. In addition, we contributed funds to each member of the Swimming and Mountain Biking teams travelling to Nationals.

We have also proudly supported the six students who travelled to the United States to compete at the International Community Problem Solving Conference. As well as this, three students from Kerikeri High School travelled to Wellington this year to compete in the New Zealand Schools' National Debating competition, which we also contributed funds towards.

Olivia Jack won the short story section of the National Spanish Literary Week Competition, run by Massey University. Her story was a fairy tale about Sofia and a genie, written under pressure during a 2-hour time slot. This was the first time a Kerikeri High School student has entered the competition.



Student Voting

Student Voting was set up by a group of students in the Social Studies department to coincide with the national local body elections. It was an opportunity for the students in our school to express their voice by casting their votes. Prior to voting day, students were introduced to our local candidates in a powerpoint presentation. Year 9 students Niamh Donaldson, Mereana Huirama-Moore, Jack Sadgrove, Vinnie Johnston, Savana Kilpatrick and Josh Bossa had the opportunity to help organise and run the day. Everyone who chose to cast their vote, then the student organisers counted our votes and shared the information with the national youth voting team in Wellington. The results were also shared with our local council.



We are proud of Kerikeri High School's representation at the Dawn Service for Anzac Day. Leadership

The Tradescantia Terminators were recognised for their leadership in our community by the Northland Regional Council, who awarded them "Highly Commended" in the Environmental Action in Pest Management category at the inaugural NRC Environmental Awards. The team have continued to work with groups such as Year 9 and International students weeding and planting native trees and with primary school students, teaching them how to make and use pouter to gather the beetles that eat the tradescantia weed. They also designed and built an information board for the Wairoa Stream.



Massey University's Young Women's Leadership Programme inspires young women to step up and exercise leadership within their peer groups, schools and communities. The programme has been designed to build the confidence and networks of the young women who attend.

We had an awesome experience and were lucky enough to go down to Massey University to learn about what it means to be a woman in leadership. We developed a project called "Litterless" which was about keeping the community tidy and litter awareness. We organised a waste-free bake sale and donated funds to Keep New Zealand Beautiful; we then arranged a community clean up around central Kerikeri. We are so thankful for this experience and learnt so much about what it means to be a leader and a tidy kiwi.

Academic and Cultural News

International Problem Solving

The Community Problem Solving Team of Emilia Finer, Charlotte Gamble, Jeany Kim, Charlie Potter, Faith Hohepa and Emilie Jones competed against 73 Teams from 14 Countries during the Future Problem-Solving International Conference at the University of Massachusetts in the United States. The team placed 3rd in the Senior Community Problem Solving Division, the highest result ever for a New Zealand Team in the Senior Division.

Attending the Future Problem-Solving International Conference at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, America was an incredible experience. The conference began with an opening ceremony in which each state and country had the opportunity to display their home flags. It was a great chance to see all the different states and countries from around the world who were competing, and it was during

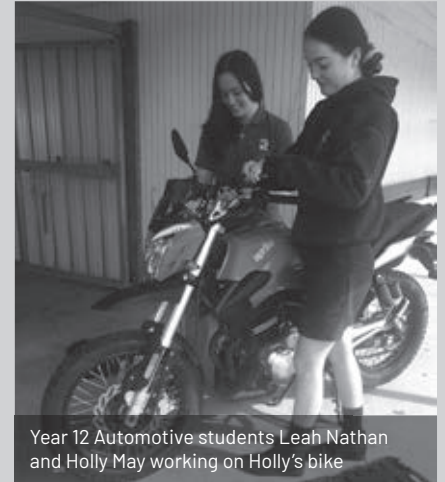

We continue to be grateful for the commitment of Schools' Mentor Mr Ross Paterson and Mr Hayden Clarke, Branch Manager of the Kerikeri office and his team at Barfoot & Thompson.

Debating

Students continue to enjoy lunchtime debating, with over 100 students involved from Year Seven to Year Thirteen. This has been our first year of after school Debating Club; an opportunity for our debaters to practise their skills against other teams.

We have seen a great deal of further success for our Kerikeri High School Debating students. They performed extremely well in the Northland Debating Selection Tournament where the winning team was Katey Whitehead, Acima Mabidikama and Sophie Fox. Second place in this tournament went to Hannah Watson, Faith Hohepa and Samantha Dearnley. Hannah was named Highly Commended Speaker and Katey was the Speaker of the Tournament. As an outcome of this competition, Katey and Acima were selected as part of the Northland Team and Sophie and Faith were named as the travelling reserves.

In May, Katey, Acima and Sophie travelled to the New Zealand Schools Debating Nationals in Wellington. Twelve teams from around New Zealand took part and the finals were held in the Parliament buildings. Katey received the award for Highly Commended

Olivia Jack, Nimish Singh and Lexa Kathro finished 9th at the Spanish Debating Nationals with only Olivia having competed the previous year. Students have 45 minutes to prepare their argument for the debate in their second language. They did exceptionally well; coming within 3 points of winning the first debate. Then they improved by 35 points in the second round to win by 12 points.

Matthew Galbraith, Abi Caley and Rosie Robinson attended the Young Enterprise Entrepreneurs in Action weekend in Wellington. Rosie Robinson was selected as one of eight students to travel to Sao Paulo, Brazil in December this year on a fully funded Young Enterprise experience.

Sarah Doherty and Gillian Toala were selected for the New Zealand Youth Symphonic Winds, an auditioned concert band for ages 16 to 24 and essentially the National Band of New Zealand.

Rebekah Cook's photographic work was Highly Commended in the Bright Awards, which celebrate emerging creative talent from senior secondary school students across New Zealand.

Hospitality Success

Nimish Singh placed 2nd in the Year 11 category of the STANZA National Speech competition and Gilda Tejada placed 2nd in the Scholarship category.

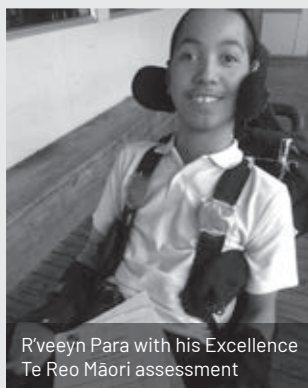

Science

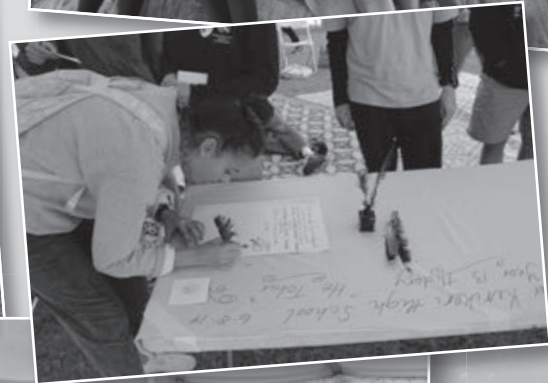
History

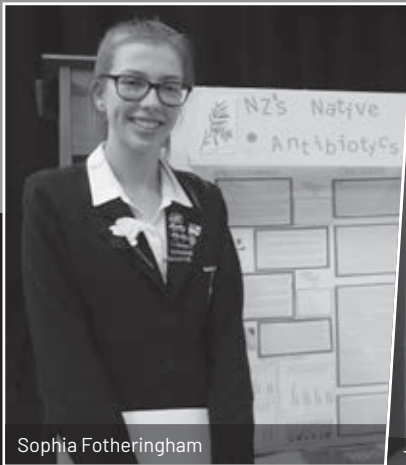

History Scholarship students visited the University of Auckland, where they experienced university-style lectures on the subject of Populism as an Historical Force.

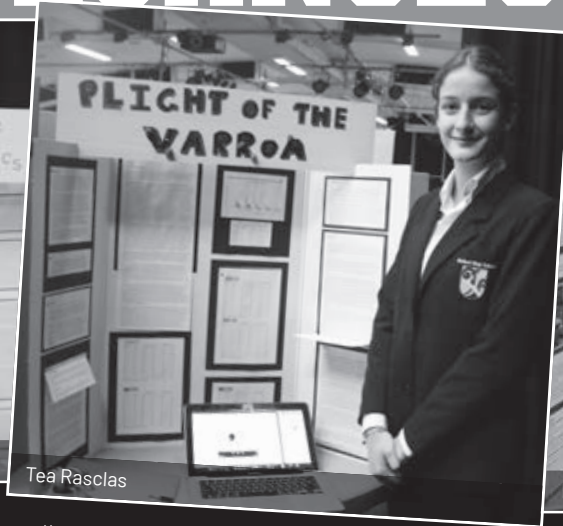

Geography & Tourism

The Maatangi Whenua Northland Regional Competition for Year 11 Geographers is an academic event that involves activities testing their geographic knowledge and their ability to apply it. 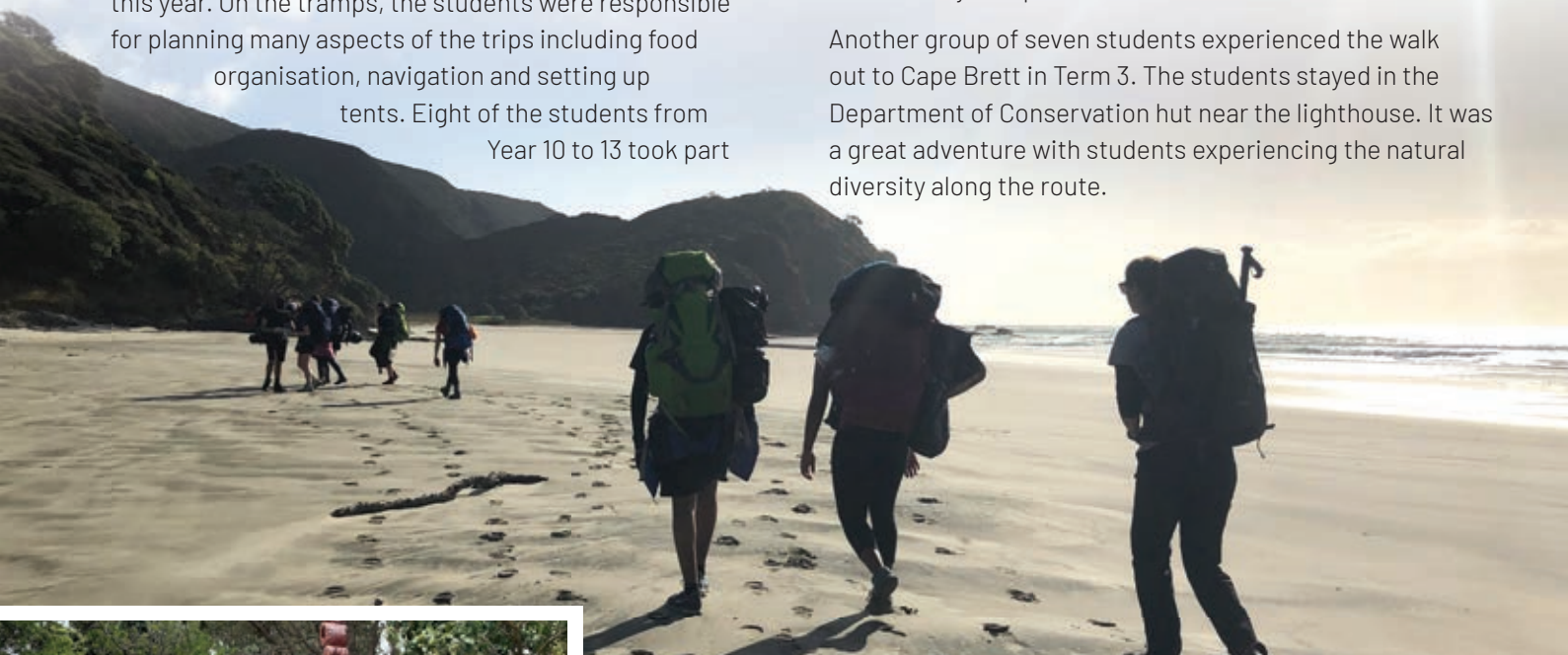
Duke of Edinburgh

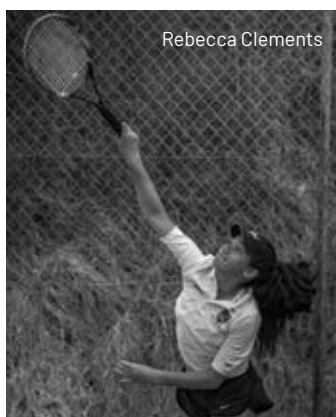
ASB Sports Awards

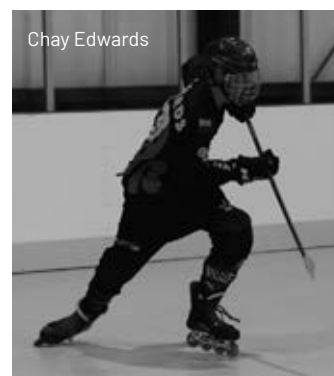

UNIVERSITY TRIP

Forty Year 13 students attended the University Trip where we went to five Universities in the upper North Island. It was a good opportunity to explore the campuses and find which university is best for you. We started off at AUT where we did an amazing race around the campus. This allowed us to see the university while having fun as we interacted with other schools. We later went to the University of Auckland where we had a tour around the campus. We received social and academic advice from two Residential Advisors, as well as viewing the available accommodation. We were able to see what the halls provide for students including study assistance, food, sport and other recreational facilities.

We attended Waikato University the next day at their annual open day. This meant we were able to talk to current students as well as attending multiple lectures of our choice. As we weren't able to travel to Wellington or Otago, we had the opportunity to have specialised discussions with representatives at their Auckland offices. We discussed which majors and minors are available at our chosen university. The following day we attended Massey University at Albany. This included tours around the university and accommodation. We were shown the gym, a giant chicken wing, the facilities available and accommodation. Overall the trip provided many Year 13's with a better idea of their ideal place of study.

Gateway

Gateway is a work experience programme where mature and work ready students are encouraged to work one day a week for a minimum of 6 weeks. This year we have had 117 students placed in 134 roles with 67 different employers.

Students who undertake Gateway, are working in real workplaces, gaining work experience and building skills for employment. Students complete Core Generic Unit Standards throughout the year and have access to First Aid and Health and Safety courses in the holidays. For the first time this year we also ran Learner Drivers Licence courses. Assisted by the local police, we have had 100% success with students learning the road code, then being escorted to sit the test.

We have students doing work experience in a range of pathways including Primary Teaching, Hairdressing, Barista, Automotive Engineering, Plumbing, Cabinet Making, Forestry and Retail. Many students gain part-time paid

employment or even apprenticeships from their Gateway employers. Students gain skills they can add to their CV and usually references from employers.

During 2019 we have had Gateway students leave Kerikeri High School with apprenticeships in boatbuilding, marine systems engineering, electrical, building, plumbing and drain laying. Students have left school and gained fulltime work in fencing contracting, barbering, tank installation, tow truck driving and technology repairs. Students have also gained part-time work with their Gateway employers or gained work due to their placements. It is really exciting supporting our students to find career paths that they are keen to follow.
