University Scholarships

ongratulations to the following ✓ Year 13 students who have been awarded Scholarships to support them in their tertiary studies. These scholarships are prestigious and come with substantial financial awards. This acknowledgement of the hard work and success of our students is a credit to them and to the Four Cornerstones philosophy of our school.

Te Paewai o te Rangi: The University of Waikato Scholarship for Outstanding Academic Achievement was established to contribute to the University's Vision of achieving excellence, distinctiveness, and international connectedness. Recipients Rehutai Armstrong Kingi and Andrea Cotton achieved NCEA Level 2 with Excellence and have shown exceptional leadership qualities as well as being actively involved in community initiatives. This Scholarship is valued at \$25,000.

Stella Blackwood was awarded the University of Auckland Academic Potential Scholarship valued at the top tier of \$20,000, which also guarantees Stella a place in a University Hall of Residence. This Scholarship supports students who have achieved academically to undertake tertiary studies.

University of Auckland Top Achiever Scholarships were awarded to Max Couling, Jessica Mooney, Casey Roberts, Nimish Singh and Gillian Toala. Every year the University receives thousands of applications for these awards from students throughout New Zealand. Valued at \$20,000, these Scholarships recognise exceptional ability and outstanding achievements as well as leadership potential.

Summer Curran was awarded the University of Otago 150th Scholarship to the value of \$14,000. These scholarships provide for students who have demonstrated academic ability and show potential and motivation to succeed at university. Emily West received the University of Otago Performance Entrance Scholarship valued at \$17,000, which was established to encourage excellence in areas of performance including sport, culture, music, and the arts. These scholarships are available to academically able students who have demonstrated high-level ability in their chosen area of performance.

Lisa Wilson, Ella Taurua, Charlie Weston and Jamaine Young accepted the University of Otago Māori and Pacific Peoples Entrance Scholarships, valued between \$14,000 and \$18,000. Established by the University in 2005 to celebrate academic excellence and cultural diversity, this Scholarship encourages the progression of Māori and indigenous Pacific Peoples into tertiary study.

The Auckland University of Technology (AUT) Welcome to Auckland Scholarship recognises student academic achievement, potential leadership ability and contribution to the school, community, or cultural pursuits, and was awarded to Isabella Doubleday and Hope Korewha. Valued at \$17,000, it is available to high achieving secondary school students living in rural areas outside of Auckland.

Hope Korewha was also awarded the McDonald's Te Tai Tokerau Scholarship for study at AUT, with a value of \$12,500 over three years of study. The Scholarship programme supports Māori students to gain tertiary qualifications that will assist in the economic, professional and community growth of their hapū. Sakura Aihara and Lachlan McCreanney were awarded the AUT Find Your Greatness Scholarship - Hike Ake (Lift

Up), valued at \$14,000, to support students who demonstrate academic potential to attend University.

The University of Otago Leaders of Tomorrow Entrance Scholarship was awarded to Patrick Godson (\$6,000), Anika Green (\$7,000) and Emilia Finer (\$10,000). The Scholarship assists students who have demonstrated all-round ability and who exhibit leadership potential to attend the University of Otago. The Vice Chancellor's Scholarship was established in 2015 to celebrate the excellence of students enrolling at the University of Otago. This Scholarship valued at \$6,000 was awarded to Georgia Doherty.

Max Donaldson received the University of Canterbury Auaha Scholarship valued at \$5,000, which recognises and encourages innovation and entrepreneurship amongst intending first year students at Te Whare Wananga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury. This gives Max the opportunity to participate in a sponsored programme for budding entrepreneurs and innovators through their Centre for Entrepreneurship.

Luca Brassett and Henry Ludbrook were awarded The Victoria University of Wellington Totoweka Scholarship for Equity and Support. These Scholarships valued at \$5,000 each can be put towards accommodation costs at a Victoria Hall of Residence, or as a contribution towards first year living costs.

Waikato University's Ko Te Tangata School Leaver Scholarship is awarded primarily based on evidence of academic readiness at NCEA Level 2 and strong community spirit. Kayle Hyde, Poppy Kirkham and Heidi Nichols received this scholarship valued at \$5,000. A Knox College Accommodation Scholarship valued at \$2,000 was awarded to Anika Green to support her in her first year at Otago University.

Nimish then advanced to the national semi-finals of the speech competition in Auckland, where he delivered his speech and attended the Race Unity Hui and the National Final of the Speech Awards.

ur **Social Action in Senior Social Studies students** focused their research and social actions this year on the question "Why is there a need for foodbanks/pātaka in Aotearoa?" They were working towards an inaugural Social Action Week. A wide range of actions were planned such as a bake sale and sausage sizzle to raise funds for Kairos Foodbank in Kerikeri, work with Year 8/9 classes to collect food items, and students who live in Kaikohe planned to collect items to help stock up the local pātaka. A group worked with Frontline Church to support their work in the community, a short informational documentary was made, and two students worked with Kerikeri Primary School leaders on a mufti day and foodbank appeal. Students also worked with Year 7 classes to

collect food items and lobbied Members of Parliament to make it mandatory to have rohe based facilitators for foodbanks and pātaka in Aotearoa. Students also worked with a local supermarket to make it easier to find information about donating to the national foodbank on their website. Our staff were also involved through donating, baking, and adding items to their online shopping to support our students to succeed.



This year we celebrated the 20th anniversary of **KERI Reading**. The highly successful programme was created by a group of Kerikeri High School Community Problem Solving students who wanted to use the tuākana-tēina learning model to help foster the love of reading. Volunteer Year 13 students train to be reading buddies to selected Year 7 readers to support them in developing their reading enjoyment and confidence. They meet once a week and read together in pairs.

Toala and Nimish Singh were selected as finalists in the Lions International
Young Ambassador's Competition.
Students from all over Northland had to submit a written application and personal statement about their contributions to their community, with only four finalists chosen from across Northland.
All students were then interviewed by a panel of judges, before making a speech to the assembled Lions Members.
Nimish won the competition, along with
\$1000 and the right to go forward to compete at the next level.











Academic NEWS

amaine Young and Stella Blackwood represented New Zealand at the International Geography Olympiad competition in Wellington. The team of four Geography students from around the country usually join in Wellington for training. Unfortunately, this year due to travel restrictions, the New Zealand team was not able to travel to Turkey but instead competed online against other teams representing 60 nations. The iGeo competition consists of three parts: a written test, a multimedia test and substantial fieldwork requiring observation, leading to cartographic representation and geographical analysis.







n July of this year, Senior Debaters hosted Parliamentary Services and their Outreach Speakers Programme. We were lucky enough to welcome both Dr Shane Reti and Speaker of the House, Rt. Hon. Mr Trevor Mallard. Several senior debating students debated the issue of whether or not a wealth tax should be introduced. The debate was entertaining and a valuable experience for our senior students.





The Secondary Schools' Regional REINZ
Auctioneering event was a brilliant display
of talent and tenacity again this year. Previous
champions, Nimish Singh and Nicolas Powell,
competed against a talented group, including
Faith Ward, Lydia Bailie-Bellew, Tiree Robinson
and Joe Howells. The \$1,000 prize, donated
by Barfoot and Thompson, was taken out by
Nimish Singh, with Nicolas Powell coming in a
very close runner up. Lydia Bailie-Bellew won
the top Female Auctioneer.

Nimish, Nicolas and Faith competed in Auckland at the Nationals, against the cream of the crop from other secondary schools. This National REINZ event was a proud moment for Kerikeri High School and their outstanding mentor, Mr Ross Paterson, from Kerikeri's Barfoot and Thompson: Nimish Singh was named as the National winner of the 2021 REINZ Auctioneering Schools' Championship and Nicolas Powell was runner-up.

Millie Caswell and Shannon Miringaorangi won the Best Original Storyline for Spanish 2 in the inaugural WoolyCon competition. They had to draw and write an original comic influenced by Señor Wooly characters. Students from 137 schools across 5 countries competed.

Year 8 student Franky Sefton's story
'The Legend of Hoiha' was awarded
Highly Commended in the New Zealand
Intermediate School Writing Competition,
which had over 500 entries from 40 schools.
Franky's story was included in the 'Beyond
Beneath Below' anthology, published in June
of this year.

ector Danilo's artwork was selected for the National Youth Art Awards. This prestigious nationwide award is open to young artists between the ages of 13 and 25, including established artists and students. Hector's drawing 'Yggdrasil' (The Tree of Life) was exhibited for a month in Hamilton.

hree Kerikeri High School teams were selected for the Rotary Model United Nations Assembly held in Auckland. Nimish Singh, Rachel Smythe and Gillian Toala represented Ireland, Marshall Arvidson, Sakura Aihara and Kayle Hyde represented Qatar, and Savannah Hancock, Patrick Godson and Casey Roberts represented Libya. 100 teams from the Northland/ Auckland area representing 100 different countries took part in the two-day event set to copy the United Nations Assembly. Each team chose two remits based on current global issues to speak about in front of the 300 participants.

The annual Jock Hodgson speech competition, supported by Rotary, showcases the talents of the most eloquent and thought-provoking speakers in the school. The students who have won the school speech competition for their respective year level, go on to compete against one another for the ultimate accolade. The quality of the speeches this year was exceptionally high, and the range of topics and styles of delivery were engaging and entertaining for the audience. Eva-Sky Gundry was announced as the overall winner.

Imish Singh gained an Elite Award in the Education Perfect World Language Championships. He placed in the top 0.2% of competitors in the world and was the top student from over 151 000 competitors. Gold Awards were achieved by Emma Betts, Gemma Griffiths, Sasha Marchant and Shannon Miringaorangi, Michelle Horsfall and Matilda Townsend received Silver Awards and Casey Roberts, Braeden Leung, Zoe Ackers, and Phoebe Williams were awarded with Bronze.

Mimish Singh won the top student prize in the national Whakataetae Reo Māori – Māori Language Competition. He also won the Certamen Literario Prize for his short story in Spanish. This is a national Spanish writing competition run by Massey University where students write a fictional story of up to 1500 words.

The Immerseme Games, an online language immersion competition, is growing in popularity. Our students performed at a very high level, with Gillian Toala achieving the Laureate award with her results of 1st in World overall, 1st Mandarin Chinese and 4th in Spanish. Pippiana Voakes and Matilda Townsend received Gold awards.

Three teams represented our school at the Northland Kids Lit Quiz. Our Year 8 team of Ava Yarrow, Roisin Godson, Zoe Fisher and Shilay Coles placed second out of the 33 teams.

athex is a challenging and fast-paced mathematics contest where schools across Northland compete against each other in teams to answer questions as quickly as possible. The winning team is the first to gain an absolute score of 100 points or the team which has gained the highest score at the end of 30 minutes. Eleven teams were selected from Years 7-10 to represent Kerikeri High School at the annual Mathex Competition in Whangarei. Our students had a great time representing our school, with one Year 10 team bringing home bronze medals: Leo Duncan, Devon Buxton, Harley Kingston, Mitchell Thomson-Reid; and one of our Year 9 teams placing 4th: Grace Gundry, Michelle Horsfall, Nikitah Underwood and Ella Wade.









Titration day is an exciting event on the Year 13 Chemistry calendar. Students spend the day completing their analysis of how the concentration of a chemical changes when something else changes using titration. This year some students considered how the temperature of different types of juice affected the vitamin C content of the juice. Others looked at how the oxygen content of water in local waterways was affected by the distance of the sample site from a particular significant point on the waterway. The students work together to support and encourage each other with the often-tricky process of analysis.

Samuel Fan, Reuben Cook, Toby Graham were involved with 'The Problem is Absolutely Rubbish' a Year 12 Science initiative driven by students to source and monitor compostable waste, plastic and cans. Their primary audit data of our outdoor bins estimated that nearly 3000 kg of compostable matter is thrown into landfill annually.
















Other competition winners were also announced at the YES event. Eva-Sky came 1st and Jacob Fewtrell came 3rd in the Kerikeri Design and Print Business Card competition. Georgie Ludbrook (Afters) came 2nd and Nicola McDonald (Natures Wood, Rakau Taiao) came 4th in the Northtec Business Plan competition.

The Year 12 and 13 Business Management students had their Trade Fair at the Old Packhouse Market. Eva-Sky Gundry was awarded the Judges' Prize for Best Business with her Wahine Surf School and Jacob Fewtrell was awarded second prize for his business in which he has developed an automatic letterbox light. Jacob also won the public vote for Best Team for this enterprise.

Luca Brassett, Holly Thackwray and Max Donaldson were selected to be part of the 2021 Entrepreneurs in Action event. Selected students have all their expenses paid to attend the three-day programme, which focuses on developing creative thinking to solve a problem. This was an opportunity to work with other students from around the country and gain mentoring from business leaders.

The end of year regional celebration for Young Enterprise produced some fantastic results for our students, with seven Kerikeri High School companies nominated for awards. The event started with the regional finalists pitching their

businesses to a panel of judges followed by an awards ceremony and dinner.

The main award of the night, the Top Energy award for YES company of 2021 went to Eva-Sky Gundry, with Jacob Fewtrell gaining second place and Max Donaldson third.

Eva-Sky's prestigious award has led to her pitching her business to a panel of judges in December to compete for the National YES Company of the year. These are outstanding results and well deserved. All these students have worked extremely hard on the respective businesses this year.





















Gateway

ateway is a work experience programme for Y12-13 where mature and work ready students are encouraged to work one day a week for a minimum of 6 weeks. In 2021, 112 students were placed within 134 roles with 66 different employers.

Students who undertake Gateway are working in real workplaces, gaining work experience, and building skills for employment. Students also complete Core Generic Unit Standards, and First Aid and Health and Safety courses in the school holidays to avoid disrupting curriculum time. Where possible, we organise units of work from the Industry Training Organisations which are usually assessed by Workplace or Industry Assessors.

This year we hosted three very successful Learners Driver's License courses run by an outside provider and assisted by the local police, with most of the costs funded by the Ministry of Social Development. We have had 100% success with students learning the road code, then being supported to sit their Learners Test.

We have students doing work experience in a range of pathways including dairy farming, electrical, landscape gardening, beauty therapy, equine, tourism, art gallery, diesel mechanics, golf, and

plumbing. We provide students with any equipment they may need and can provide transport when needed.

This year we have had Gateway students leave school with apprenticeships or trials in building, plumbing, roofing, and truck driving. In the new year we have students ready to begin roofing and electrical apprenticeships. Students have gained part-time work with their Gateway employers or gained work due to their placement.










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












he Duke of Edinburgh programme is in its sixth year at Kerikeri High

Board of Trustees Report

Like it's badly behaved brother 2020, this year has challenged us all. But even amongst the constant change, the Board of Trustees has continued to work together as a cohesive team which has allowed us to focus on our students, faculty, and support staff.

Our Senior Leadership Team (SLT)

Our Principal Mrs Elizabeth Forgie took a sabbatical in term 3, effectively study leave, which must be approved by the Board and then the Ministry of Education. Elizabeth's request to us was to write the story "Te Rerenga Kotuku: Our long-term commitment to school reform with a vision of equity for Māori and how it benefited all." Essentially a journal of what we have changed and where we are on the journey.

The aim was to tell our story in a way that provides a resource, inspiration, ideas, and encouragement for others. Elizabeth's intention was to collaborate with Dr Mere Berryman and Professor Russell Bishop, but it coincided with the second national COVID lockdown in August. Although the impact of COVID restrictions meant her paper was shorter than intended, it did not detract from the quality and the Board were so impressed with her work that we agreed it should be required reading for all future Boards and staff.

Our Associate Principal Mr Mike Clent has the Board's acknowledgment and thanks for his outstanding leadership during the Principal's sabbatical. Mike stepped up to lead our school through two lockdowns. The second COVID lockdown for Northland in August was unexpected and swift, but the school was able to quickly adapt after so many lessons learnt over the last 20 months. Communication from Elizabeth and Mike to our school community has been regular and extensive over this year, and feedback from parents has been generous and supportive.

We also thank our Deputy Principals Mr Daniel Wise, Mr Hal Walker, and Mrs Justine Strang who is on secondment from her Dean position. Justine was asked to join the team as an Acting DP to cover for Mrs Maddy Haydock who has moved to the Education Review Office in Wellington. The Board work closely with SLT and know that they are out of their offices and on the grounds every day, working closely with our students and staff. These demands on their time mean that they're not always immediately available to others, so we do encourage you to contact your child's teacher or Dean in the first instance.

Our Staff

We are also deeply thankful for all our staff: the teaching faculty and the support staff. As we have said before, they are a team who made our school a safe and stable place for our students when so much in their world has been turned upside down. Even when, like us, their home lives were so

different, they stayed focused on supporting our school community.

Our staff have worked extremely hard whether at school or from home, to provide meaningful work for our students, maintaining that critical connection with classes. Not all our students have been able to access work digitally, and when the COVID lockdown happened, it was SLT who collated and delivered over 140 packs of learning materials to students around the school area, with those further afield couriered to their homes.

We have all worked together this year like any good whānau, and have done our best to support each other, which sometimes has been as simple as just listening.

Our Results

This is a good opportunity to remind our school community of the Education Review Office (ERO) review completed at the end of 2019. Their overall evaluation noted that the school's "performance in achieving valued outcomes for our students is strong". Even more so that this rating of "strong" is the third in a row over a period of 10 or so years.

Our NCEA results show that our school continues to exceed if not equal the national measures. Last year's achievement results included:

- 82% of Level 1 students (national rate was 71%).
- 92% of Level 2 students (national rate was 80%),
- 74% of Level 3 students (in line with national rate),
- 90% of our boys (national rate was 78%).

Achievement for Māori was above the national averages at all Levels, with Level 2 at 16% ahead of the national rate for Māori.

At school, our students have achieved success at the highest levels in all the four cornerstones (sporting, cultural, leadership and academic) and as always, we were delighted with the Scholarship results with over \$500,000 awarded. We acknowledge the teachers who put a lot of extra time in with these students.

The Board acknowledge all our students in sports, auctioneering, debating, business, science, kapa haka teams competing locally and around the country.

Our Physical School

The Property Committee have again worked solidly to keep the buildings and grounds maintained, with many of our planned repair and upgrade projects completed. In terms of impact, our major building works in previous years have been equalled at the

end of this year with the installation of solar power panels on the BES block at the front of the school and the gymnasium.

Completion of this project is an exciting and innovative move that will generate up to 43% of the school's electricity. The use of data monitoring software will bring major benefits to student learning in Maths, Science and Social Studies. This environmentally friendly use of sustainable power makes a significant contribution towards Kerikeri becoming a carbon neutral town, and our school is playing a leading role, noting that we will be the owners of the largest solar power system of any primary or secondary school in New Zealand.

Our Finances

As we said last year, the Finance Committee were grateful to have made the decision in 2019 to accept the Government's contribution in lieu of parent donations. It has meant that we have been able to withstand the financial impact of COVID, although this year the school has had to have slightly larger classes. The forced closures this year has also reduced our expenditure somewhat. We are constantly analysing our expenditure to find ways to work smarter in economic terms. The solar power project is an excellent example, and we expect to make considerable cost savings in the years to come.

Our Processes

As we do every year, the Board have been reviewing our processes regularly. We always start the year with a plan, but we've been hampered these last two years by events completely out of our control and have had to shift focus rapidly and constantly. We are pleased though that this year we've been able to finalise some overdue work. This included consulting with the community on our Policy on Bullying Prevention and Response. This goes hand in hand with the new Policy on Behaviour Management which sits as the overarching policy for managing behaviour.

We thank all those who provided us with their input, and as with all school policies, the Board will review and revise these regularly. The school contracted with SchoolDocs earlier this year which means that all Kerikeri High School policies will be available on the school website to read or download. We anticipate they will be available by mid-2022.

Of note, the Board also conducted a self-review this year, following a similar process carried out by the Disciplinary Committee last year. That saw several changes in how we work with student suspensions,

always with the student at the heart of the process, but ever mindful of keeping all our staff and students safe.

Our International Friends

Our International Department are an important part of both our school and our community, and although this year we have only a handful of international students, we are still hopeful that when the borders eventually reopen, we will be able to open our doors to the world again. We thank those families who are part of the homestay group and our international staff team, most of whom are working temporarily in other departments.

Our Community

Our school community is more than our staff and students. It is the parents and caregivers, grandparents, aunties and uncles, cousins. Those living in neighbouring properties. Local businesses, many of whom support us financially, or employ our students. Just like our students and staff, you are all always front of mind in everything we do. The Board acknowledge each one of you and thank you for your continued support as we all work together as one to raise our students.

Our Board are now looking at our final year together; the elections which are normally held in June every 3 years have now been pushed out to September 2022. The Ministry of Education have made this decision which they have said will allow the implementation of electronic voting. This Board can look back with pride in what we have achieved and look forward to next year to implement other projects that we are working on.

We know that this hasn't been an easy year for you, but you have all of us looking out for you, all your community supporting you, and we are all very proud of you. Solar Power Project

We are excited to share with you that our new Solar Power project has come to fruition, with the installation of solar power panels on the roof of the BES building and Gymnasium roof in term four. The 178.88kW PV Solar System, by SuperPower, will produce an estimated 209,918 kWh of power in its first year of production.

Once installed and operating, Kerikeri High School will be the owners of the largest solar power system of any school in New Zealand, generating up to 43% of our electricity.

Historically, Kerikeri has been amongst the towns of New Zealand with the highest sunshine hours per year. Given that we are operational during sunshine hours, the school is ideally suited to generating and using solar power.

This is an exciting and innovative initiative for our school. Kerikeri pays the highest price for power of any town or city in New Zealand, more than 34% above the national average. The financial savings for the school over the coming years will therefore be significant and are estimated to be about \$1,385,000.00 over the next 25 years. Over the 25-year life span of

the system, the use of solar power at Kerikeri High school will reduce carbon emissions by an estimated 675 tonnes.

The use of data monitoring software also has significant application to student learning across a range of curriculum areas including Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. This learning will increase awareness of power usage, energy conservation, the impact of energy use on the environment as well as providing a real-life context for mathematical and scientific leading across all levels of our local curriculum.

We acknowledge and thank Mr Gerry Buxton for his expertise in assisting and guiding us through our very detailed and thorough work to bring this project to completion.
