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Principal's Message

Kia ora koutou

Despite some spectacular overnight thunderstorms over the last week or so, it is suddenly starting to feel like Spring, with longer days and warmer temperatures. For us at school that means we are really into the business end of the school year, with Mock Examinations and final internal and external assessments looming for students sitting NCEA in Years 11, 12 and 13. An organised, focused and disciplined approach to preparation and revision is the key to success.

Community Connection



Music Department Showcase Concert

Last week saw the Music Department students perform two concerts for Riverview School and Kerikeri Primary School and an evening Showcase Concert for whānau and friends. These concerts featured approximately 30 students from Year 7 to 13, delighting their audiences with a range of instruments and a variety of music styles. Many of the performances were for Senior Music assessments as well as items from our Music Itinerant Programme.



NCEA Literacy and Numeracy Co-Requisites

You may be aware by now through recent media coverage that as part of the changes to NCEA this year, students are now required to pass Literacv and Numeracy assessments to enable them to unlock their NCEA qualification at Level 1 and beyond. Known as co-requisites, students will need to achieve 10 Literacy (5 Reading and 5 Writing) and 10 Numeracy co-requisite credits. These 20 co-requisite credits sit outside the 60 NCEA credits which make up a Level 1 NCEA qualification.

Students will achieve these co-requisite credits through sitting three assessments in each of Reading, Writing, and Numeracy. These tests are completed on-line and may be sat by students during two assessment periods set by the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) - once in Term 2 and once in Term 3. Students will not need to wait until Year 11 to sit and attain the 20 corequisite credits; they can be sat in Year 10 for example.

Our current students in Years 11, 12 and 13 who have already met the previous NCEA Literacy and Numeracy requirements in 2023 or earlier are unaffected by these changes.

Year 10 students are entered into these corequisite assessments during Term 3 this year, along with any students in Years 11 – 13 whom are yet to meet the requirement. Many secondary schools are taking this step, and we are confident a good number of our students will benefit from getting these Literacy and Numeracy credits as they head into Year 11 and NCEA.

Our Year 10 students are currently preparing for these assessments and will be sitting them during Weeks 8 and 9 of this term. This assessment window is set by NZQA and coincides with our Year 11 – 13 mock exams. This will give students the opportunity to achieve the co-requisites this year, so that they are able to focus on the 60 credits required to pass NCEA level 1 in 2025.

Kerikeri High School 50th Jubilee

Our Jubilee celebration is now just over a week away. The cutoff date for buying tickets is Monday 9 September and tickets are available from School Reception. No door sales on the night.

Year 11 – 13 Mock Examinations

Mock Examinations for Year 11 – 13 students will be taking place from Wednesday 11 September – Thursday 19 September inclusive. During this time, Year 11 – 13 students will be on study leave, and normal classes will not run for them. Students will only be required at school when they have an examination or assessment scheduled.

The purpose of these examinations is to give students an opportunity to sit practice external assessments in a formal examination setting, complete work towards externally assessed portfolio work, or work on internal assessments if a subject does not have any external assessment.

The grades from these practice assessments may also be used to support derived grade applications at the end of the year should a student either be unable to sit their NCEA examinations or feel that their performance in an examination has been impaired, for reasons beyond their control. More information about derived grades will be provided in Term 4 to students and parents.

Additionally, opportunities for students to complete the new NCEA reading, writing and numeracy assessments are scheduled for students who are yet to meet these requirements.

Morning sessions run from 9.00am – 12.00pm and afternoon sessions from 1.00pm to 4.00pm.

Students should be at school, outside the scheduled room, at least 10 minutes before the start of a session. A study room will be available for students at school for silent study.

Normal classes for Year 11 - 13 students will resume on Friday 20 September.

These examinations and assessment opportunities are an important part of the year, and we will be supporting students to make the most of this opportunity as they progress through their NCEA qualifications.

A copy of the examination timetable is available on our website, and via the school app.

Energy Drinks and Chewing Gum

We are concerned about the number of students, many very young, who are arriving at school in the morning with energy drinks. Students should not bring energy drinks to school, and we strongly discourage students from purchasing and consuming them before school. Learning is negatively impacted by these drinks, as students are overstimulated and find it hard to settle, focus and concentrate. We will be confiscating energy drinks from students who have them at school from the beginning of next week.

Chewing gum is also not allowed at school. We will be reminding students of this through the coming weeks.
